Valley Education for Employment System (VALEES) is a regional delivery system established by the Illinois State Board of Education which serves 17 school districts, two area career/vocational centers, one special education cooperative and Waubonsee Community College, covering a five-county area.

We are directed by ISBE to:

•Support career & technical education curriculum and program development

• Provide professional development for teachers, counselors, and administrators

•Assist schools in technology and equipment updates

•Assure efficiency, access and equity in delivery of career and technical education

•Submit and administer career and technical education-related grants and disperse funds to member districts

• Promote local business and industry partnerships with education at all levels

VALEES is divided into three sub-regions:


 Indian Valley sub-region is comprised of eleven feeder districts to the Indian Valley Vocational Center

GRANTS

VALEES receives grant funds from both state and federal sources. The purpose of both grants is to develop the academic, career and technical skills of secondary education students who elect to enroll in career and technical education programs by:

1) Strengthening academic and technical skills of students in these programs to meet the Illinois Learning Standards through preparation for high skill, high wage, or high demand occupations in current or emerging professions;

2) Promoting the development of services and activities that integrate rigorous and challenging academic, career and technical instruction, and that link secondary education and postsecondary education for participating career and technical education students;

3) Providing services and activities designed to develop, implement, and improve career and technical education, including programs of study;

4) Providing technical assistance to promote leadership, initial preparation, and comprehensive professional development at the local level that improves the quality of career and technical education teachers, faculty, administrators, and counselors;

5) Supporting partnerships among secondary schools, postsecondary institutions, baccalaureate degree granting institutions, area career and technical education schools; local workforce investment boards, business and industry, and intermediaries; and

6) Providing activities for support, development and implementation of an organized sequence of career and development learning activities for students in kindergarten through eighth grade.

BUSINESS AND INDUSTRY

ADVISORY COMMITTEES

The purpose of business and industry advisory committees is to assist school administrators and instructors in offering quality, relevant occupational education programs. The Valley Education for Employment System and Waubonsee Community College maintain joint advisory committees.

A business and industry advisory committee should consist of five to fifteen members, not including ex-officio members, who are employed in or who have experience in occupations served by a program. Ex-officio members may include program teachers, students, and VALEES and WCC administrators.

Members named to an advisory committee shall reflect the composition of the communities served by the program. Factors to be considered in the selection of nominees shall include, but not be limited to, geographical distribution in the program service area, representation from various age groups, levels of education, program graduates, minority groups and both genders. A program advisory committee shall focus on the following issues to assure program quality and relevance to current occupational standards and practice.

- Training needs and placement opportunities for the program assigned
- Curriculum, instruction and minimum standards
- Regulations and safety in program related occupations
- Facility, equipment and supply standards
- Related academic and occupational information required
- Community based training, production and projects used in instruction
- Publicity and public relation
- Student and faculty recruiting standards
- Counseling, guidance and placement of students
- Professional development of program teachers

VALEES regularly schedules on-site visits to business and industry partners in order to enhance teachers', administrators' and counselors' knowledge of current workplace practices and necessary employability skills.

ILLINOIS STATE COURSE SYSTEM (ISCS)

VALEES approves CTE courses for member schools. Data on student course enrollment is reviewed for accuracy and any anomalies are resolved with the member districts. Data reported yearly to ISBE from the Student Information System (SIS) determines the level of career and technical education funding for each district.

MINI-GRANTS

Mini-grants totaling \$45,710 were awarded to support Career and Technical Education Improvement initiatives focusing on the regional priorities of (1) Career Pathways and Programs of Study, (2) Integrating Common Core Standards in CTE, (3) Strengthening Employability Skills, and (4) Career and College Readiness.

BURGESS-NORTON SCHOLARSHIPS

VALEES assists Burgess-Norton by facilitating the application, interview and award process for two annual scholarships of \$2,500. The scholarships are awarded to students in the VALEES region entering a college degree program in a Manufacturing field.

This year VALEES hosted a virtual Apprenticeship Week with Painters District Council 30 and IBEW 461. During the week of November 9 – 13, 2020, VALEES partnered with eight local Unions to present a series of virtual visits intended to introduce students to various career paths and apprenticeship opportunities within each trade. This event served approximately 450 students from seven schools in the VALEES region.

MANUFACTURING WEEK

During the week of October 26 – 30, 2020, Valley Education for Employment System (VALEES) partnered with Valley Industrial Association (VIA) and 9 local manufacturers to present a series of virtual visits intended to introduce students to various career paths within modern manufacturing companies. This event served just over 350 students from 6 schools in the VALEES region.

CAREER READINESS

GRAPHIC STUDENT OF THE YEAR COMPETITION

Regional graphic teachers invited their top student(s) to participate in the annual VALEES Graphic Student of the Year Competition. Each participating student submitted a digital portfolio that was reviewed and judged by a group of professional graphic designers, college graphic arts program coordinators, and Waubonsee Community College Graphics staff.

COLLEGE CREDIT ARTICULATION
